Harvey Keitel, originally cast in the lead role, was fired and replaced by Martin Sheen, who had a heart attack. An overweight Marlon Brando, paid a huge salary, did more philosophizing than acting. Coppola filmed for four years with no ending in the script. The shoot threatened to be the biggest disaster in movie history.
